### MEET THE OUTHORS



**Cara Sue Achterberg** is the author of seven books, including *One Hundred Dogs & Counting*. Her most recent novel, *Blind Turn*, won the Women's Fiction category of the American Writing Awards. Cara is a blogger, writing coach, and cofounder of the national nonprofit, Who Will Let the Dogs Out. She lives in the Shenandoah Valley with her husband, three rescue dogs, and a cast of foster dogs and cats.



**Ryan B.** is an author/illustrator of comics and graphic novels for all ages. He has been making comics all his life, except for a brief pause between the ages of 10 and 32. His latest graphic novel, *Swap Meet and Other Stories*, debuted in Fall 2023. Ryan probably has a new project out now or coming soon!
