MEET THE OUTHORS



Linda Berry's lifelong love of literature and the visual arts culminated in a twenty-five-year career as an award-winning copywriter and art director. Now a full-time author, Linda writes mystery thrillers — most notably the Sidney Becker mystery series. Linda currently lives in Virginia with her husband and miniature poodle.



Sydney Tooman Betts resides with her husband near the extensive cavern system that inspired the setting for several chapters in her series *The People of the Book*. Betts has experienced a variety of cross-cultural adventures in North and Central America as well as in Europe and the Middle East. Her teaching experiences span from preschool to guest lecturing at the graduate level. Before penning her first novel, *A River too Deep*, Betts ghost-wrote stories for an adult literacy program.



Saloma Miller Furlong was born and raised in an Amish community in northeastern Ohio. With an eighth-grade education, she acquired her GED, enrolled in community college courses, and became an Ada Comstock Scholar at Smith College. She studied at the University of Hamburg in Germany for a semester. At age fifty, she graduated with a major in German studies and a minor in philosophy. Furlong is the author of three books and her story has been featured in two PBS American Experience films, The Amish and The Amish: Shunned. She is the mother of two grown sons and lives in Broadway with her husband David.



Allison K. Garcia is a Licensed Professional Counselor, but she has wanted to be a writer ever since she could hold a pencil. She is a member of Shenandoah Valley Writers, Virginia Writers Club, the Author Transformation Alliance, and is a Municipal Liaison for Shenandoah Valley NaNoWriMos. Allison's works about marginalized Christians have won several awards and her stories have been featured in six anthologies. She has five published novels: Vivir el Dream, Finding Amor, Finding Seguridad, Finding Paz, and The Dry Depths of My Soul.



Clifford Garstang is the author of two novels, Oliver's Travels and The Shaman of Turtle Valley, and three story collections, In an Uncharted Country, What the Zhang Boys Know (winner of the Library of Virginia Literary Award for Fiction), and House of the Ancients and Other Stories.
